Einstein's God Letter, First Editions At PBA Galleries February 14

rare and important letter from Albert Einstein, shedding light on his concept of God's existence, will be on the auction block Sunday, February 14, at 8 am, in the Cordova Room of the Pasadena Sheraton, during the Antiquarian Booksellers' Association of America Book Fair next door.

Written late in his life -Einstein was to pass away less than two years later at age 76 — the letter is a concise and reasoned declaration in which Albert Einstein categorically denies the value of the God concept for physics, a statement that reveals the philosophical reasoning behind Einstein's denial.

An end-of-life statement, the letter is Einstein's final reasoned and mature view of the topic, and thus of great significance (\$60/90,000). As a famous scientist, Einstein was often asked to make public pronouncements about God and his own religious views.


Written in response to a brash college student who asked him if he had ever resolved "the question of the existence of God in the perceivable universe," the letter is characteristic of Einstein's best problem solving and exhibits a new turn of reasoning not found in Einstein's earlier statements about God. Einstein writes, in part, "The question should rather be: How far is it reasonable and justifiable to assume the existence of an unperceivable being? I see no justification for the introduction of such a concept. In any case, it does not facilitate the understanding of the orderliness we find in the perceivable world..."

Also on offer are a second William folio edition of Shakespeare's Comedies, Histories, and Tragedies, 1632, with John Milton's "Epitaph" (\$200/300,000); an important archive of 26 manuscript letters signed by King Philip IV of Spain to Louis Enriquez de Guzmán, 9th Count of Alba de Liste, his viceroy in New Spain, 1651–1653, instructions for governing the colony (\$80/120,000) and a first edition set of Denis Diderot's Encyclopédie, ou dictionnaire raisonné des sciences, 35 folio volumes, 1751-1780 (\$40/60,000).

Rounding out the auction will be an original drawing by Lewis Carroll in illustration of The Hunting of the Snark, and an autograph letter from him to the book's illustrator critiquing $_{
m his}$ (\$30/50,000); a first edition of Uncle Tom's Cabin, in the original cloth, with an autograph sentiment signed by Harriet Beecher mounted on front endpaper (\$12/18,000), two bound volumes from the mid-Nineteenth Century with hand painted illustrations demonstrating Chinese military formations and tactics at the time of the Opium Wars and ongoing internal conflict $(\$7/10,\bar{0}00).$

Also on offer are two seminal articles describing the DNA molecule, in their original journal format of weekly issues of Nature magazine, 1953, each signed by coauthors James Watson and Francis Crick (\$20/30,000).


